GOVERNOR LAMONT VISITS BLOOMFIELD

Governor Lamont Announced In Bloomfield Bonus Payments to Child Care Workers

At the end of May, Connecticut Governor Ned Lamont announced that the Connecticut Office of Early Childhood has completed the distribution of \$70 million in state funding that was allocated by the governor and the state legislature in the most recently enacted state budget for bonus payments to the staff of child care and early childhood education providers statewide in Connecticut. The announcement was made locally at the Bloomfield Preschool and Childcare Center.

The initiative, known as Wage Supports for Early Childhood Educators, is intended to help stabilize the child care industry and support its workforce, which has historically been underpaid across the nation. Governor Lamont has been eager to uplift this essential workforce with the goal of retaining staff in childcare centers and homes. Approximately 21,000 early childhood educators and staff statewide are receiving the bonus payments.

"Early childhood educators and staff are an essential part of our communities and help make Connecticut the most family-friendly state in the country," Governor Lamont said. "These workers not only provide safe and nurturing care to our youngest infants, toddlers, and preschoolers, they are a major part of developing their abilities to expand their education skills as they get older, and they enable parents and guardians to obtain their own employment to support their families. Child care is critical to our workforce and economy. We must support this important industry that is so vital to families, the workplace, and society."

The Office of Early Childhood, with technical and customer support from the United Way of Connecticut, distributed the funding in two phases. The first phase totaled \$15 million and was completed in the fall of 2022. The second and final phase totaled \$55 million and completed this month. Payments were made by the state to the operators of the child care and early childhood education providers, which had to apply for the funding and then are responsible for distributing the bonus payments to their staff. The final phase includes a guaranteed per-person bonus payment based on the hours child care staff work. Full-time employees receive a \$1,700 base payment and part-time employees receive a \$650 base payment. Staff and programs can receive additional funds based on meeting specific criteria, such as certain Office of Early Childhood licensing, accreditation, and program participation in the Care 4 Kids program.

"The wage support grant is a step in the right direction and signifies to us, as early childhood educators, that the state of Connecticut appreciates the hard work that we do every day for our children, families, and communities," Jessica Salvador, director of the Bloomfield Preschool and Childcare Center, said. "Most important, it demonstrates that the State of Connecticut values the importance of early childhood education."







ORGANIC WASTE PROGRAM/VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

In partnership with All-American Waste, the Town of Bloomfield launched a unique new food scrap recycling pilot program at no cost to the residents. Those that are taking part in the program were delivered a brown food scrap recycling cart and a counter top pail to their residence. All American Waste is picking up the food scraps on the day of the normal trash pickup and they are then bringing those scraps to an anaerobic digester where the waste is transformed into renewable energy.

The pilot program began with 239 homes in Bloomfield, split up into two different areas. The Thursday pickup comprises of 138 homes, while the Friday pickup serves the other 101 homes in the program.

Through the first seven weeks of the program, over two tons of food scraps have been collected, with an average of 8.89 pounds per household on each pick up.



Several streets are hovering right around the 50% mark, led by Arlington Street, which has had an overall participation of 56% through the first six weeks. Mitchell Drive and Wesleyan Terrace are just under 50% and Trinity Circle is participating at clip of 40%.

More than one-third of food goes uneaten around the world. In the United States alone, 60 million tons of food is wasted annually at a cost of over \$160 million. That's why it's imperative we find solutions to manage this organic material.

SUMMER SAFETY TIPS

1 Shade: UV rays are strongest and most harmful during midday, so use this time for indoor play.



2 Protect Head to Toe: Wear a wide brimmed hat to provide a shield by casting a shadow around the face, including ears, eyes and neck

3 Sunglasses: Look for sunglasses that wrap around and block as close to 100% of UVA and UBA rays as possible.



4 Sunscreen: Use SPF of 30 or greater. Reapply every three hours or after prolonged exposure to water.

5 Monitor your moles: Perform a full body skin exam at home at least once a month in order to stay aware of any changes in your moles.

SUMMER SAFETY TIPS

TICKBORNE DISEASE IS A SERIOUS ISSUE IN THE STATE OF CONNECTICUT THIS SUMMER.

The best defense, at this time, is understanding your risk and the things you can do to protect yourself and your family.

Ixodes scapularis, also known as the "blacklegged" or "deer" tick, is the primary vector of the pathogens Lyme disease, anaplasmosis and babesiosis.

Ixodes scapularis nymphs and females that have ingested human blood are known to transmit these pathogens.

The probability of pathogen transmission increases with time as proportionately more blood is ingested from the host.


Ticks without blood in their midguts have not been attached long enough to pose a risk of infection.

Those that would like to have a tick tested can contact the West Hartford-Bloomfield Health Department. We strongly encourage submitters to pay close attention to their health after a tick bite. The tick testing is helpful information, but cannot be used as a diagnostic tool.

UN-ENGORGED TICKS ARE NOT TESTED

It takes approximately 3-4 and sometimes 5 weeks to receive results from the CT Agricultural Experiment Station.

Lyme disease, or other tick borne illnesses, can onset prior to obtaining tick test results, therefore it is important to monitor health, communicate and possibly visit with a personal physician.

POISON IVY PREVENTION

Any person working outdoors is at risk of exposure to poisonous plants, such as poison ivy, poison oak, and poison sumac. When in contact with skin, the sap oil (urushiol) of these plants can cause an allergic reaction. Burning these poisonous plants produces smoke that, when inhaled, can cause lung irritation.

Symptoms of Skin Contact

- Red rash within a few days of contact
- Swelling
- Itching
- Possible bumps, patches, streaking or weeping blisters. **NOTE:** Blister fluids are not contagious

The best way to prevent a poison ivy rash is by learning how to identify the plant and avoid touching it.

Wear clothing that protects your skin including long sleeves, pants, socks and gloves when in areas near poison ivy.

Carefully remove and wash contaminated clothing (shoes and laces, too) with detergent in warm water.

Bathe pets that have come in contact with poison ivy plants, while wearing rubber gloves.



NOTABLE LANDSCAPE AWARDS

The Bloomfield Beautification Committee (BBC) invites you to participate in our 2023 annual Notable Landscape Beautification Awards. These awards are designed to encourage and promote community involvement in keeping Bloomfield a beautiful place to live, work, and play. BBC recognizes and honors residential, commercial, and industrial property owners whose properties reflect their commitment to gardening and their community pride. Properties will be judged based on neatness, creativity, color harmony, plant health, plant and tree selections, and overall effect. Does the landscape have eye and seasonal appeal? Is the space inviting? Are plant materials or hardscapes used in a creative way? Are there any

pollinator gardens? Paving and pathways should be clean and no weeds. Hoses and garden tools put away. Garden beds mulched. There should be absence of weeds and litter. Invasive plants on the property may cause disqualification.

BLOOMFIELD HISTORICAL FACTS

Originally part of Windsor, the town of Bloomfield is rooted in a 1640 settlement known as Messenger Farms, located at the eastern end of what is now Park Avenue. By the time it was formally incorporated in 1835, the settlement had grown to over 900 residents.

Traditionally an agricultural community, Bloomfield began to diversify its economic base following its incorporation. Tobacco was added to the agricultural list, as were numerous cider mills and a brandy distillery. The Prosser Inn on Simsbury Road housed headquarters of the Hartford to Westfield stage line; and the Hartford to Tariffville stage line passed through the Town Center. Within thirty years of its incorporation, Bloomfield's new rail service included eight trains traveling roundtrip to Hartford daily, and was serviced by four stations in

town. In 1891, The Hartford Electric Light Company brought Bloomfield into the 20th century, and by 1920 the town's population had grown to over 2,000.

Party Endorsements by major party for municipal offices by town committee, caucus or convention shall be held from July 18, 2023 through July 25, 2023 inclusive. The offices that candidates shall be nominated and endorsed for are the following

- Town Council
- Board of Education/4 year term
- Board of Education;/2 year term
- Town Plan & Zoning commission
- Town Plan & Zoning Commission Alternate
- Zoning Board of Appeals
- Zoning Board of Appeals Alternate
- Library Trustees

Primary petitions for opposition candidates of a major party for municipal offices must be submitted to respective Registrar of Voters by 4:00pm on August 9, 2023. On the filing of a valid petition for municipal office, and once all names are verified, the Town Clerk shall publish a notice informing the public as well as Secretary of the State's Office of such primary. If the Town of Bloomfield were to have a primary it shall be held on Tuesday, September 12, 2023 and the polls will be open between the hours of 6:00am and 8:00 pm.
